CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

Welcome to the Manly Baseball District Association annual general meeting 2020.

This year we celebrate 70 years of the Manly Warringah District Association. I'm sure baseball was played in the area well before 1950 and much has changed since then. It is both a testament and a tribute to those who established this organization that we are still here today playing and promoting this incredible game on the peninsula.

It has been 8 years since the formation of the RSA whose purpose was to unite all the leagues: Junior, Minor and State League under one governance structure. I have been Chairman of the RSA board for 5 years and in that time we have had many achievements. I am especially pleased to see that there is a broad feeling of comradery and a desire to work together to achieve great things for all of baseball.

The past 18months however have seen several challenges for the RSA Board and our local sport. I believe the ongoing uncertainty around the future of baseball at aquatic was the most pressing issue we have ever faced. Unfortunately dealing with it occupied much of the boards time. There were countless meetings with Council, State MPs, the Department of Education and Department of Planning. Many on the board including Mike O'Neill, John Farrant, Simon Lowde and myself put in many extra hours to meet with officials to try to resolve the ground issue.

I want to acknowledge an individual who helped the board navigate this crisis over the last 18 months. Gary Highland was truly a blessing to have throughout the ordeal. His background and experience working in State Government brought a level of knowledge and expertise that was not only calming but helped us focus our energies in the right places. I believe that we were taken much more seriously because of the efforts and guidance Gary provided.



CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

In some respects, having Aquatic located on an old tip site may have been our saving grace. Although no official word has yet been given it seems that the moving of Forest High to Aquatic is no longer on the Council and State agenda. As such I believe we can now turn our energies from saving Aquatic to improving it.

A big thank you to the current RSA executive. Simon Lowde (Treasurer) works tirelessly for the association. Stew Gall (Secretary) brought a measured and corporate approach to the board. It was a fantastic executive team. It would not be possible to operate our association without the dedication of the entire board. The work they put in for their respective leagues is above and beyond.

To the committee presidents: Michael O'Neill – State League President, Michelle Camphuis & John Farrant – Minor Leagues President, and Brook Russell – Junior League President, a very sincere thank you. To the rest of the RSA board thank you for your support and contribution throughout the year.

And to all the individual members of each of the division committees, State League, Minor League and Junior League, thank you for the wonderful job you do of running each division and keeping the game going.

State League ramped up their offering again this year with some awesome themed food nights for the midweek games and the rollout of live broadcasting of games on the newly formed EBSN channel. The junior league continues to host a Wednesday night competition at Aquatic to support State League with attendance at games again increasing.



CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

Minor League continues to grow across all the competitions: Summer, Winter and Masters. It is great to see so many adults out there enjoying the game. It is great to see that the minor league competition is catering to all levels of baseball. I believe we offer one of the best Minor League competitions in Sydney.

With the uncertainly of Aquatic and hopefully the Covid scare behind us we can now really focus on what's important: offering the best baseball experience at all levels of the game. I am so looking forward to getting back on the diamond and cannot wait for the resumption of competitions!

FISCAL YEAR – MARCH 2020

INTRODUCTION

The 2019/20 season finishes with one of our biggest years of baseball with increased activity across all playing entities. Ensuring a financially strong and durable sporting club the financial management of MWDBA has focused on the following strategies:

- The fiscal management of each playing entity ensuring they are contributing to the overall wellbeing of the club.
- Through marketing and promotions present the game to the baseball community to reinvigorate their passion for baseball. Creating a festival atmosphere and enjoyment for all ages.
- Defending the Aquatic grounds from development.

This season, MWDBA has experienced significant activity and achieved the following:

- Junior teams representing Manly Warringah in all age groups competing in the NSW State Titles and National Championships.
- The presentation in April 2019 of the Junior League/Intermediate NSW State Titles at Aquatic Reserve which were a resounding success. This resulted in BNSW awarding MWDBA with the Junior League/Intermediate and Minor League/10-11's NSW State Titles for 2020.
- Introduction of Eagle Baseball Sports Network (EBSN). Providing State League with the capabilities to stream games live.
- A welcoming reintroduction of Women's 2nd grade.
- The launch of Minor League 2nd division and thereby expanding the Summer competition.
- A smashing Wednesday night competition with crowds up to 300 people.
- Unfortunately, North Sydney Juniors Club chose to leave MWDBA and join the Ryde junior's competition. This saw the reintroduction of North Shore Baseball Club with a focus on providing players from the Lower North Shore and Chatswood area to play in the MWDBA junior competition.



MWDBA financials are a combined set of accounts reflecting all the activities of the Association which includes Juniors, Junior Representatives, Minor League, and State League. Minor League maintains three competitions Winter, Summer, Masters and State League includes Grade, U18's, Women's and the Futures team. Shared activity which includes canteen and clubhouse management is allocated based on actual activity where it can be tracked otherwise proportioned evenly across the entities.

RESULTS

MWDBA's total revenues for 2020 is \$306.7k which is significantly higher than prior year. Profits however are well down on prior with an overall loss of \$7.7k which reflects the investment strategies implemented in 2019/20.

MWDBA income is driven by several key revenue drivers being:

- Club and Player Registration
- Uniform sales
- Presentations
- Coaching Activities
- Canteen
- Sponsorship & Donations



Overall revenues across MWDBA are well up \$51.6k on prior year:

- Player registration overall up \$44k which is predominately driven by the following:
 - An increase in junior representation at Nationals \$45k with representative teams in all age groups.
 - Junior clubs' registration is down \$13k. With the departure of North Sydney there are reduced number of Juniors in 2019/20.
 - Minor league registration up \$7K with an increase in player numbers. It should be noted as of Summer 2019, Minor League has promoted the development of local senior clubs. The senior clubs are an extension of the junior clubs who will promote and drive for more seniors playing in Minor League. This ensure a pathway for players finishing juniors and continuing their baseball into seniors. Aa a consequence player registration is now managed directly by the senior clubs.
 - State League up \$6k due to the introduction of Womens 2nd grade division and increase in player number.
- Uniform sales down \$7k reflecting lower demand on new and replacement uniforms.
- Presentation income up \$6.6k with State Leagues Annual presentation being presented in April 2019 which was not reflected in prior year accounts.
- Canteen income up a staggering \$25k. Driven by State League; presenting a full complement of home games and a phenomenally successful campaign of Wednesday night baseball. Additionally, MWDBA presenting the NSW State Titles
- Sponsorship down \$16k with limited sponsorship opportunities this season. Last year MWDBA was recipient of several grants and sponsorships, which was not repeated this season. With the future of the Aquatic grounds under a cloud grant application proved more difficult.



Cost of Sales represent the direct costs attributed to each revenue type and overall, up on prior year by \$77.5K. The key movements in COGS are:

- Club and Player Registrations is up significantly \$52.4k which is driven mostly by payments to BNSW \$42k for additional teams representing Manly at National Championships compared to prior year and Minor League up \$6k with more umpiring activity and general increase in costs. State League up \$4k with introduction of women's team and general increase of costs.
- Uniform sales down \$6k.
- Presentation of State League end of season presentation up \$4k.
- Canteen supplies up \$16.5k due significant to increased activity
- Other costs up \$4.7K which include BNSW presentation, BNSW fines and other general costs.

General expenses represent the costs to support the running of MWDBA and other general activities in support of baseball. This includes Administrative, Financial, Advertising & Marketing and Game, Ground & Equipment. Overall general expenses are on par with prior year:

- Administration expenses are on par with prior year.
- Finance costs up with the annual subscription to MYOB \$1.4K and additional costs with upgrading being done to automate the process and reduce the transactional workload.
- Legal expense up \$3.6K, incurred to secure visa sponsorship status for MWDBA as well as some visa application costs for Ryan Kalish.
- Advertising and Marketing costs on par with prior year with MWDBA continuing its marketing and advertising presence in the baseball and local community.
- Expenditure in Game, Ground and Equipment is well down \$10k on prior year driven mainly by less expenditure in playing equipment with investment being conducted prior year.



ASSETS

Members Equity is up to \$105.6k of which retained earnings was \$113.3k and current year's loss of \$7.7k. Of this balance, it is predominately made up of a cash balance of 99.3k.

Current assets, in addition to cash are a small amount of trade debtors of \$3.4k. Debtors is predominately reflecting some player fees outstanding from Junior representatives and State League Women's. With the impact of COVID-19 collections have been difficult over the last few months.

LIABILITES

Liabilities are accruals \$15.7k and advance deposits \$13.2k. Key accrued amounts represent ground levies \$11.7k and lights 4.0k. Advance deposits of \$13.2k reflects fees paid for participating in NSW State Titles that were scheduled for April 2020 and State League playing tops which are to be refunded.

PERFORMANCE

In summary, the overall loss of \$7.7k reflects the additional investments made this season in the following way:

- Promotional campaign by Juniors to provide playing gloves and hats to new registrations.
- The equipment required to support the introduction of ESBN.
- The legal fees invested to secure MWDBA sponsorship status for import player.



PLANNING

In prior financial reports, I have identified several key challenges that MWDBA continue to face over the foreseeable future. Over the past 12 months some progress has been made and in my view continues to be foremost for the club and we must maintain the fiscal resources to engage.

I. Grounds:

The use and demand of our sports fields in Northern Beaches is forever increasing and the Northern Beaches Council is actively looking to improve sports ground use and facilities by developing a 15 year strategy to provide a single approach to the management and long term planning of sporting facilities on the Northern Beaches.

We have seen through the leadership of Mark Lowe, president of the Pittwater Club his success in securing considerable funding for the Rat Park baseball grounds. This has included a new clubhouse, new fencing, dugouts and soon to be built, batting cages. This is a great outcome for the PBC and baseball across the region.

The fight for Aquatic grounds, home of Forest Baseball Club and Manly Baseball continues however indications suggest that interest for the grounds has waned albeit nothing in writing has been received. The focus for next season will be a push for investment in the grounds with many aspects of Aquatic infrastructure well past their prime.



II. Playing Numbers:

Player numbers in MWDBA juniors continues to decline. In contrast playing number in seniors is climbing with the transition of Juniors to Seniors continuing to improve.

In preparation for 2019/20 season a lot of effort by junior club presidents was dedicated to the recruitment of players which ensured across the region in these clubs' player numbers were held. Recruitment of players went very well however this was offset with retention remaining challenging. This includes the loss of the senior league players which did support a growth in senior players.

The loss of North Sydney has reduced our playing base by 20%. This is not ideal and further challenges our junior competition.

As written in prior years, we are currently well supported by eager and qualified coaching and I know the baseball community is incredibly grateful for the time and effort that they commit to the sport.

MWDBA will continue to look at ways of supporting our coaches and ensuring that infrastructure and equipment is avlaible to support their efforts.

While we are progressing with these challenges, I look forward to the support of MWDBA and the baseball community as we promote and improve Baseball in this region.

Notes to the combined Financials Statements

For the year ended 31 March 2020

Reporting Entity

Manly Warringah District Baseball Association Incorporated (MWDBA) is based in NSW, Australia. The combined financial statements of the association are as at and for the year ended 31 March 2020. This set of accounts comprise of all activities as managed and controlled by MWDBA. MWDBA is a not for profit entity and is primarily involved in the management of baseball in the Northern Beaches of Sydney, NSW

Basis of Preparation

The MWDBA combined financial statements are general purpose statements which have been prepared in accordance with Australian Accounting Standards (AASBs) adopted by the Accounting Standards Board and the Corporation Act 2001.

Basis of Measurement

The consolidated financial statements have been prepared on the historical costs basis

1 Revenues

MWDBA reporting segments are based on the internal competition entities; Juniors, Representatives, Minor League and State League. Minor League maintain three competitions Winter, Summer & Masters and State League includes the competitions State and Women's League, however for reporting purposes are consolidated. Shared activities which includes canteen and clubhouse management are allocated based on actual activity where it can be tracked otherwise proportioned evenly across the entities.

Revenue are generated by a number of activities which include player registration, uniforms, presentation, development, canteen, sponsorships and donations.

Total revenues are well in excess of prior year up \$51.6k. This has been driven by the following key movements;

> State League up \$6k mostly due with the introduction of Womens 2nd grade division and increase in player number

- Uniform sales down \$7k reflecting lower demand on new and replacement uniforms.

- Presentation income up \$6.6k with State Leagues Annual presentation being presented in April 2019 which was not reflected in prior year accounts.

- Canteen income up a staggering \$25k. Driven by State League presenting a full complement of home games and a very successful campaign of Wednesday night baseball. Additionally, MWDBA through the presentation of the State Championships was able to capitalise on a high canteen patronage.

- Sponsorship down \$16k with limited sponsorship opportunities this season. Last year MWDBA was recipient of a number of grants and sponsorship; which was not repeated this season. With the future of the Aquatic grounds under a cloud grant applications proved more difficult.

Firstly, I would like to thank the Junior Baseball Committee for their tireless efforts in administrating baseball in the Manly Warringah District. The Committee dedicated a significant amount of their time to the betterment of baseball, both as representatives of Manly Baseball and of their own clubs.

MINOR LEAGUE MASTERS 2020

Masters baseball continued its popularity in the Manly area during the year, with the competition running an Autumn short season format (9 games + Grand Final).

There was strong player interest for Masters baseball, however the competition was again limited to four teams due to the lack of availability of lighting on grounds and Aquatic 1 being heavily utilised by State League and Juniors during the week.

The season saw Forest returning as Champions after defeating the Ballers in last year's Grand Final. In addition, Mosman and Pittwater both returned to the competition, with Pittwater providing a number of new faces trying baseball for the first time or returning to baseball after a hiatus.

The season started off very promisingly, with the early rounds played out in a fantastic spirit and plenty of banter on the hill amongst the teams as they shared stories and a drink after games. However, weather and the coronavirus pandemic were ultimately to play a big part in disrupting the latter part of the competition.

There were a number of washouts, reschedules and then washouts of reschedules, and the managers of all teams are to be commended for their flexibility in trying to ensure as many games as possible could be replayed. Despite our best efforts, two rounds of games were wiped out, leaving Forest and the Ballers once again ready to face off in the Grand Final.

Unfortunately, the season being pushed back a couple of weeks to accommodate replays ultimately proved detrimental for the season. With the outbreak of the coronavirus (COVID-19), Baseball NSW ordered the cessation of all baseball activities just days before the Grand Final was due to be played. Whilst disappointing for the players and committee, it was the right decision for the health and safety of our players.

On the plus side – when we finally come out of baseball hibernation, we can start the summer season off with a bang by holding a delayed Masters Grand Final!

The Masters concept is one that I strongly believe in. It is attractive to older players in the area due to the timing of the games (6.30pm / 8.15pm) during the week. Masters is the perfect environment to reconnect with the sport. It is played under tightly controlled 1.5hr game times, with a '5 across the plate rule'. It is also highly sociable with the games generally much more relaxed than traditional weekend competitions.

The competition has been wholeheartedly supported by clubs including Mosman, Forest and Pittwater, and once again the Ballers (with Seasiders likely to replace the Ballers in next year's format). The shorter format aims to encourage a level of churn in rosters such that teams can change personnel relatively quickly over time.

Once again, the major problem for growing the Masters competition is the availability of Aquatic 1 during summer. Limited to only Monday nights, the maximum number of games is limited to two per week. In the absence of greater access, the competition is unable to grow.

Council funding for game quality lights on outer grounds (A2 and A3) or down at Rat Park (RP1) would be a huge benefit to the sport and should be pursued now that the battle to save Aquatic appears to have been won (at least for now). Another potential option would be for Juniors (Senior League) games to be shifted back to Saturdays to allow Friday night games under lights, which I consider could also facilitate solid canteen sales.

There is huge potential to be unlocked within the Minor League, with the first stage implemented at the start of summer through a restructure eof the competition management and fee structure. The restructure of Minor League incentivised greater direct involvement from the 'junior' clubs through a modification of fee structures and saw club delegates added to the committee (in line with the Junior Baseball Committee structure).

The changes have seen the committee structure augment from one or two people doing everything, to a team of 7 or 8 with senior representatives from each club – each with a vested interest in growing the game.

A huge credit must go to our President, Michelle Camphuis, who has enthusiastically embraced the growth of the committee as we have put in place structures that will hopefully see the sustainability and growth of Minor League well beyond our tenure on the committee. Thanks also to Joe Weller who provides the ballast that constantly steadies our ever growing ship.

Most pleasingly for me after 7 or 8 years of various levels of involvement on the Minor League committee, is that we finally have a solid foundation on which to grow. Our grounds appear safe, the clubs have a vested interest in promoting the senior game to their juniors and parents, and we have in place an experienced committee to complement some fresh and enthusiastic faces that can drive the growth of players and teams.

The next step is to see an improvement in the facilities at the Minor League grounds (through grants, Government funding and appropriate investment of fees) to ensure that we provide a great experience for our players and keep them coming back and bringing their friends to play this great game.

What got lost in the hype though was the ability to focus on the things that matter most. In hindsight, we had more than double the number of hitters getting a 'free pass' to 1B from walks etc and that's always gonna hurt.
